What is AVRDC – The World Vegetable Center?

AVRDC – The World Vegetable Center is the world’s leading international nonprofit research and development institute committed to alleviating poverty and malnutrition in developing countries through vegetable crop research and development.

In the early 1990s, operations were expanded to sub-Saharan Africa, and a regional base was established in Arusha Tanzania. The Regional Center for Africa currently has offices in Cameroon, Madagascar, Mali, Niger and Tanzania.

Over the past 35 years scientists at AVRDC -The World Vegetable Center have successfully bred cultivars and designed technologies to increase yields and incomes in developing countries. Millions of farmers today grow vegetable crops using seed or technologies that have been developed at the Center. The Center addresses constraints throughout the vegetable value chain, from germplasm, through breeding, production, postharvest and marketing, to consumption of vegetables.

The Center builds capacity and forms alliances with partners from both the public and private sectors to promote the production and consumption of safe vegetables in the developing world.
